Resilience Roadmap OC

Many Orange County residents have been staying home and saving lives since the start of California's stay-at-home order. These efforts have allowed the state to move forward on our roadmap for modifying the statewide order. We are now moving into **Stage 2**, where some lower-risk workplaces can gradually open with adaptations. Here's what is and what is not permitted:

STAGE 2

Early Stage 2 Opening (Whole State)

- ✓ Curb-side Retail
- ✓ Manufacturers
- ✓ Logistics

Expanded Stage 2 with Attestation (Not open in Orange County pending further guidance on facility adaptations)

- ✗ Destination retail, including shopping malls and swap meets.
- ✗ Personal services, limited to: car washes, pet grooming, tanning facilities, and landscape gardening.
- ✗ Office-based businesses (telework remains strongly encouraged)
- ✗ Dine-in restaurants (other amenities, like bars or gaming areas, are not permitted)
- ✗ Outdoor museums and open gallery spaces
- ✗ Schools

NOT PERMITTED IN STAGE 2

- ✗ Personal services such as nail salons, tattoo parlors, gyms and fitness studios
- ✗ Hospitality services, such as bars, wineries, tasting rooms and lounges
- ✗ Entertainment venues with limited capacities, such as movie theaters, gaming facilities, and pro sports
- ✗ Indoor museums, kids museums and gallery spaces, zoos and libraries
- ✗ Community centers, including public pools, playgrounds, and picnic areas
- ✗ Limited-capacity religious services and cultural ceremonies
- ✗ Nightclubs
- ✗ Concert venues
- ✗ Live audience sports
- ✗ Festivals
- ✗ Theme parks
- ✗ Hotels/lodging for leisure and tourism – non-essential travel
- ✗ Higher Education

GOVERNOR'S RESILIENCE ROADMAP: CITY'S PREPAREDNESS



As we prepare to gradually reopen, we will apply many elements of the Governor's Guidance, including:

- *Disinfecting*, including facilities, vehicles and equipment
- Physical *distancing* (employees and public), including limiting *break rooms* and *shared spaces*
- Installing *hands-free devices* where possible (such as motion sensor lights, contactless payment systems, and automatic soap and paper towel dispensers)
- Implementing *digital* signatures and approvals

Replace/Restructure traditional summer programs and all-day summer camps scheduled to begin in June. Incrementally phase-in lower risk site-based activities at Community Centers, Irvine Art Center, Great Park, and Aquatics, focusing first on outdoor activities. No field trips, excursions, or transport.			

TENNIS & PICKLEBALL PROGRAMS

- Bringing tennis and pickleball back gradually, in a safe manner
- Singles play and 1:1 practice only
- Following safety recommendations from the U.S. Tennis Assn & U.S. Pickleball Assn:
 - Avoid physical contact and congregating.
 - Use new balls and mark them before play.
 - Do not share equipment or change sides.
- City-led one-on-one tennis instructional programs for children and adults.

TENNIS COURT GUIDELINES DURING COVID-19



The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends social distancing to prevent the spread of COVID-19. For your safety, please keep at least 6 feet away from others.

- **SINGLES PLAY ONLY!** Doubles play is prohibited to promote 6' distancing.
- **No congregating or lingering on or near the courts before or after play.**
- **Pickleball or other non-tennis activities on tennis courts are prohibited.**
- **Do not play if you are exhibiting any illness symptoms or have been in contact with someone with COVID-19 throughout the last 14 days.**
- **The U.S. Tennis Association also recommends the following:**
 - Play with a new ball and rotate new ones into play when possible.
 - Avoid use of your hands to pick up balls when possible.
 - Consider numbering/markings and picking up your own ball only.
 - Do not share racquets or personal equipment.
 - Stay on your side of the court; avoid changing ends of the court.
 - Remain apart from other players when taking a break.
 - Avoid physical contact such as handshakes or high fives.
 - Avoid touching gates, fences, benches, and other court amenities.

OPEN SPACE TOURS BY IRC

- Develop outdoor activities, including IRC-led programs with precautions in place.
 - Docent-led tours in locations without daily access.
 - Advance registration, social distancing, and PPE required.



SUMMER PROGRAMS

Safe Summer in Irvine

- Now: Introduce Restructured Programming
 - Tennis & Pickleball Instructional Programs
 - Online Programs & Activities
- Next: Low-risk and Modified Programs as Guidelines Allow.
 - Modified (2-3 hour) staff-led camps, one at each center, focused on outdoor activities using large open spaces for small groups
 - Modified aquatics programs, such as lap swim, water walking, & instructional programs with strict capacities and social distancing
 - Art exhibition viewing with limited, monitored admission
- Near Future: Add Programs Incrementally and Responsibly
 - Including skill building workshops and incremental expansion of aquatics, athletics & art programs
 - Add contractor led enrichment programs and wellness activities for youth and adults with strict social distancing guidelines and facility capacities and sanitization protocols in place



COMMUNITY EVENTS

- **Large events** such as Irvine Global Village Festival, Movies on the Lawn, and Summer Concert Series will be modified to avoid large gatherings.
 - **Global Village Festival Video Retrospective**
 - **Drive-In Options for Movies and Concerts**
- **Smaller events** such as Super Saturday, Splash-In Movie, and Senior Fitness Expo will be cancelled for 2020



GREAT PLATES DELIVERED PROGRAM SUPPORT

- State program administered locally by Age Well Senior Services
 - Deliver daily meals to qualified older adults.
 - Provides essential economic stimulus to local businesses and workers.
 - Senior Services staff provides pre-screening via Senior Hotline.
- Irvine restaurants will be recruited to serve as a food providers:
 - Must be able to provide breakfast, lunch and dinner in accordance with specific nutritional guidelines; delivering daily.
 - City staff will work with the Chamber to reach Irvine restaurant owners.
 - More information and an application will be available at myagewell.org.
- To qualify for the program, individuals must:
 - Be 65 years of age or older or 60-64 and at high-risk.
 - Affirm inability to prepare obtain meals Not receive assistance from other nutrition programs and earn no more than 600% of the federal poverty limit.

AMENDMENTS TO EMERGENCY ORDER – GOLF COURSES

- Members of the same household may share a cart
- Paying customers may use the restroom, one person at a time. Restroom must be wiped down every hour
- “To go” food and beverage items may be consumed at outdoor tables, with tables spaced 10-12 feet apart with social distancing observed at each table. Tables wiped down after each use.
- Beverage and pre-packaged food carts (pre-packaged food only) allowed with safety guidelines (i.e., operator to wear protective mask and gloves, customers provided with antiseptic wipes, individually pre-wrapped cups if use required)
- Range ball baskets now permitted, but must be sanitized before distribution to guests. Staff handling baskets must wear protective gloves. Ball dispensing machines must be sanitized every 30 minutes

PROMOTING EXPANDED OUTDOOR DINING FOR RESTAURANTS

To Assist Reopening of Restaurants

- Maximize social distancing in open air environment
- Dispersed seating and queuing
- Patios, common areas, and parking areas

Expedited Permitting Process

- Waiver of code provisions and submittal timelines that would otherwise hinder outdoor expansions
- Review as streamlined Special Event Permit
- Permitted for 45 day period with administrative renewals
- Implemented upon reopening guidance from State / County



SENIOR RESIDENTIAL FACILITIES COVID-19 PROTOCOL

✓ **17 Responses Received from 22 Facilities Surveyed:**

- All use gloves and masks
- All are implementing social distancing
- All take employee temperatures at least once per day

✓ **Five facilities allow restricted visitors, others are not allowing visitors**

✓ **Two facilities have ventilators on-site**

FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY – FEMA

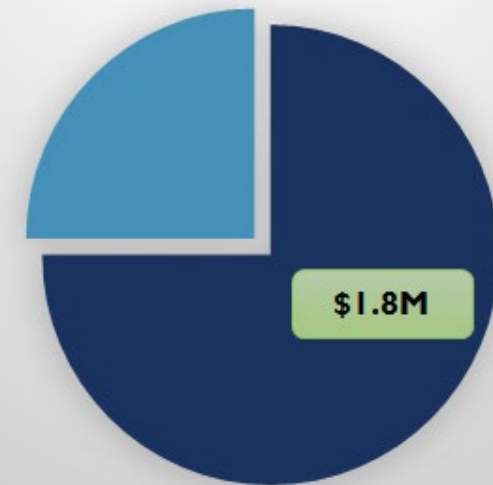
Under COVID-19 Emergency Declaration, FEMA may provide assistance at a 75 percent for emergency protective measures and include:

Management, control and reduction of immediate threats to public health and safety.

Purchase and distribution of food, water, ice, medicine, and consumable supplies, personal protective equipment and hazardous material suits, movement of supplies and persons.

Security, law enforcement, communication of general health and safety information to the public.

COOLING CENTERS

- Cooling centers provide a safe, comfortable, and air-conditioned space for residents when extreme temperatures persist and members of the public need to escape the heat. In Irvine, all community centers serve as cooling centers.
- The criteria to activate cooling centers is based upon weather forecast trigger points and when the Orange County Emergency Management Division makes notification to cities that they are activating their Excessive Temperature Plan. The City may also choose to activate cooling centers independent of County actions taken.
- Staff has developed specific protocols to respond effectively to the needs of its residents during extreme heat while complying with local public health orders and mitigating the risk of potential COVID-19 transmission. All safety measures enacted adhere to the guidance provided by CDC on COVID-19 cooling centers.

EMERGENCY OPERATION CENTER

- Staffed by members from every city department
- Procuring and providing all personal protective equipment (PPE) and sanitation/disinfectant products to City departments in need for essential staff
- Effectively coordinating, managing, and tracking donations received from community groups and individuals in the forms of PPE and sanitation products
- Linking businesses who request PPE with the appropriate resources
- Coordinating public information and outreach efforts to encourage social distancing practices within the community
- Tracking all costs associated with the pandemic, including those potentially reimbursable by the Federal Emergency Management Agency

CALLS FOR SERVICE AND CRIME RATES

- Since March 12, Emergency/911 calls for service have declined approximately 23% and non-emergency calls have declined approximately 5%
- Crime rates have also declined
- Year-to-date, overall crime has decreased by 9% as compared to 2019
- Violent crimes have decreased by 27% and property crimes by 8%
- Public Safety has received on average 9 calls per day from the community in regards to social distancing violations

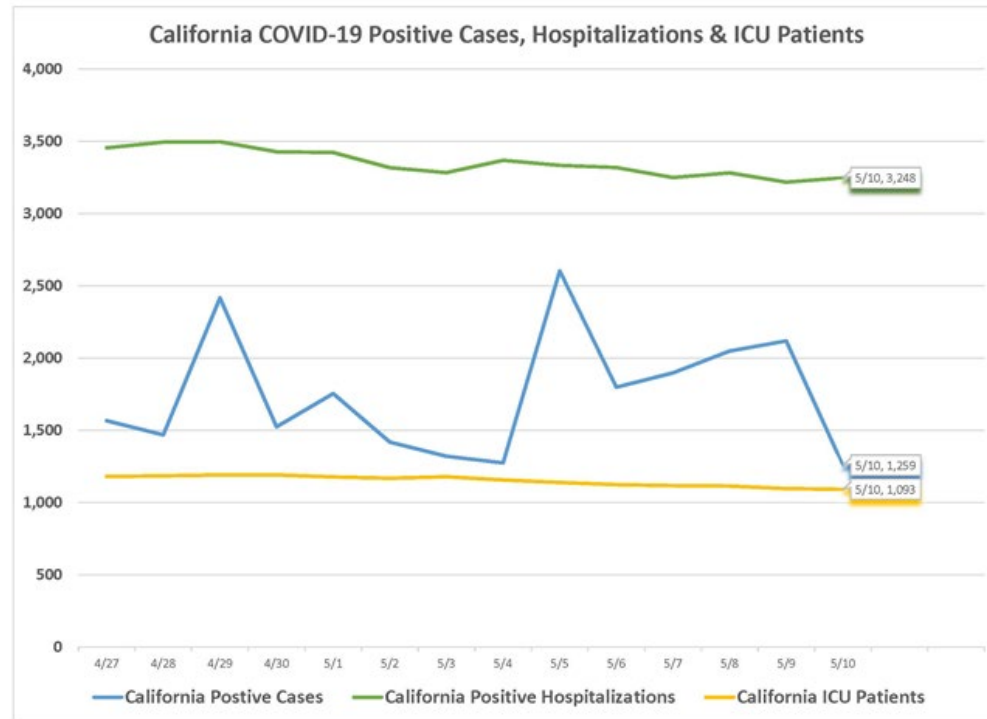
COVID-19 HOTLINE

- The hotline has been operational since March 21 and is staffed daily from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.
- Calls are generally about donations and violations of the Governor's and City Council's orders
- Since its implementation, the hotline has received approximately 731 calls – on average 19 calls per day, with the high being 33 and the low zero
- On average the number of calls during the weekend are 74% percent lower than the weekdays

FACE COVERINGS ORDER

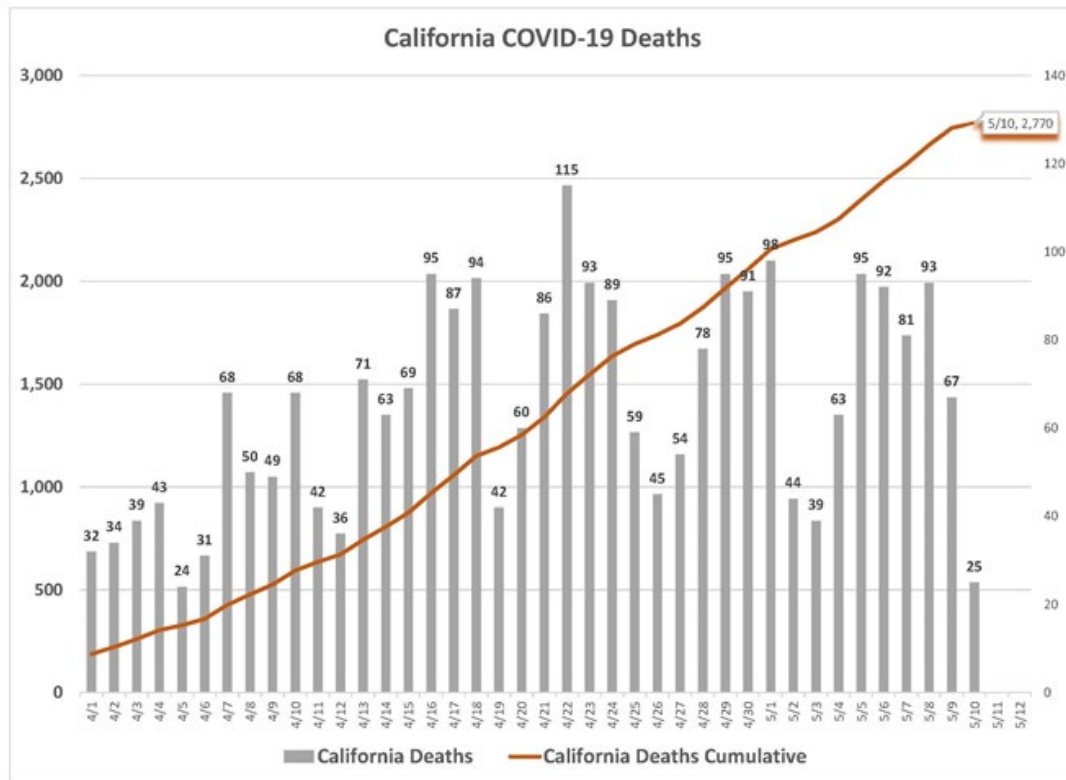
- The Business Outreach Team has contacted approximately 1,000 retailers
- All were provided with information on the City's Order specific to face coverings
- Since the inception of the Order, 24 complaints have been received
- One business has been in violation a second time after a warning was issued. An administrative cite was issued
- 4,500 masks have been distributed to businesses
- Face Coverings Order will be amended to require businesses to post signs at the entrances

COVID-19 DATA - CALIFORNIA



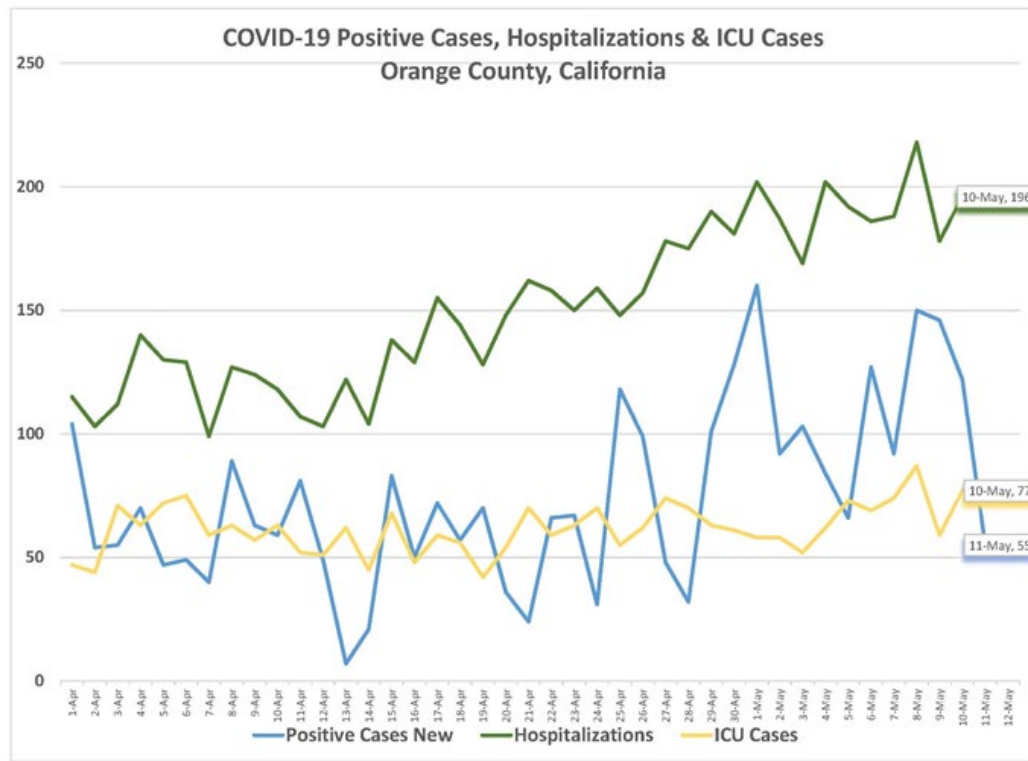
- Number of Positive COVID-19 Hospitalizations is trending down since April 29th in California with the current number at 3,248 and the two-week average at 3,351
 - 2 Week high=3,497 low = 3,218
- Number of New Daily COVID-19 Positive Cases in California with the current number at 1,259 and the two-week average at 1,748
 - 2 Week high=2,603 low = 1,259
- Number of COVID-19 ICU Hospitalizations is trending down since April 30th in California with the current number at 1,093 and the two-week average at 1,152
 - 2 Week high=1,192 low = 1,093

COVID-19 DATA - CALIFORNIA



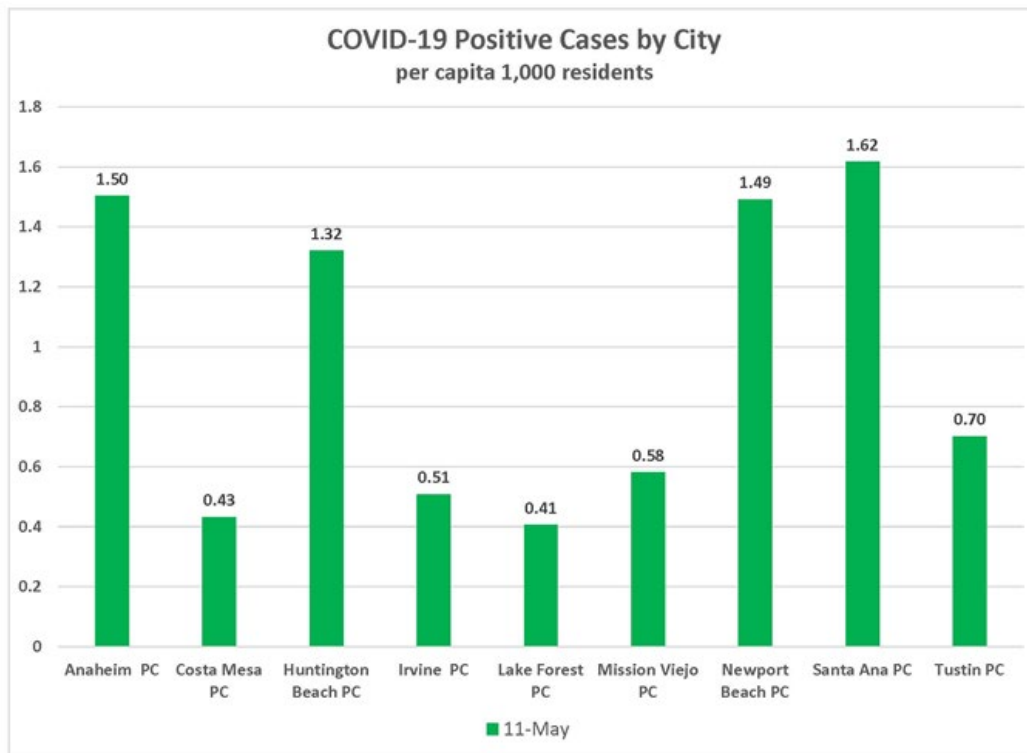
- Over the past two weeks, the number of COVID-19 Deaths in California has ranged from 25 to 98 per day
- Current two-week average is 73 per day
 - 2 Week high=98 low = 25
- The Cumulative Number of COVID-19 Deaths in California has reached 2,770

COVID-19 DATA - ORANGE COUNTY



- Number of COVID-19 Hospitalizations are continuing to trend up in Orange County with the current number at 230
 - 2 week high=230 low=175
- Number of New Daily COVID-19 Positive Cases may be starting to trend down in Orange County with the current number at 62
 - 2 week high=159 low=32
- Number of COVID-19 ICU Hospitalizations has been relatively consistent in Orange County with the current number at 100
 - 2 week high=100 low=52
- 77 cumulative deaths – One reported today

COVID-19 DATA - IRVINE



- As of May 11, Irvine has 143 known cases and per capita rate of 0.51 cases per 1,000 residents
- Of the cities geographic closest to Irvine or similar in population, only Costa Mesa at 0.43 and Lake Forest at 0.41 are reporting slightly lower rates

COVID-19 ANTIGEN TESTING FOR IRVINE PUBLIC

Public Testing Considerations

- Type of Test
- Cost to Public
- Cost to City
- Scalability
- Prior Experience

Proposed Partnership with US Health Fairs

- Non-profit organization providing healthcare services to the public
- Currently conducting public testing in Carson and Pico Rivera

COVID-19 ANTIGEN TESTING FOR IRVINE PUBLIC

Option 1 (2 Lanes)

- 6-month agreement - \$95,000
- 380 tests per day – approx. 36,480 in 6 months

Option 2 (4 Lanes)

- 6-month agreement - \$200,000
- 760 tests per day – approx. 72,960 in 6 months

Finger-prick Antibody testing may be added for an upfront cost of \$10 per resident (not FDA EUA approved)

Test Specifics

- Drive-thru Antigen testing – FDA Emergency Use Authorization nasal swab, in partnership with LabCorp.
- Tests administered by trained US Health Fairs nurses
- No cost to Irvine residents – Insurance is billed by US Health Fairs
- US Health Fairs handles reservations through their web portal
- Follow-up by a doctor with community members who test positive
- Operates 9AM – 5PM four days a week

COVID-19 ANTIGEN TESTING FOR IRVINE PUBLIC

Test Specifics

- Tentative site: Great Park, at Skyhawk and Marine Way
- Public Safety's Special Events Division will work in partnership with US Health Fairs on logistics, set-up, traffic flow, etc.
- Will require 15-24 City of Irvine personnel to manage event
 - Public Safety, Public Works, Community Services, Volunteers
- Employee testing will be conducted on First Day

Recommendation

- Authorize Staff to enter into an agreement with US Health Fairs to provide FDA EUA-approved COVID-19 antigen testing for Irvine residents for a period of six months
- Other considerations
 - Option 1 (\$95K) or Option 2 (\$200K)
 - Antibody Testing
